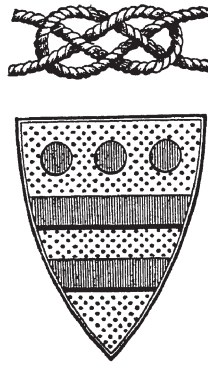


HEREWARD THE WAKE
